As you know I have been a bit all over the place recently both in terms of location and activities but not in a bad way. A very good friend of over 40 years went into hospital 2 weeks ago for a major operation to remove 70% of his liver, which I was delighted about, because the alternative would have been to give him a projection of his life expectancy which would probably have been very short. He has come through the liver operation and is now at home recovering and waiting for the doctors to start and resolve the prostate cancer issues he has which will be another long battle but one I feel sure he will fight tooth and nail to win. As a consequence, Catherine and I have been up and down to Lymm near Manchester to support him and his wife as they have no family that could step in.

Among all of that Catherine and I hosted a family get together prompted by Catherine's niece coming over from Australia and so we had 21 for dinner one evening 2 weeks ago and we had 7 staying with us the whole weekend. It was full on and busy but lovely to see everyone.

None of this would have happened without the love and goodwill that runs between family and friends and both events would have been very different without the love of God seamlessly evident at all times. If only we could see his love in action more often and in all parts of the world. It is not that he isn't there, it is just that we cannot see him at work or we refuse to accept that he is at work.

Oh that we could be more tolerant and understanding in all aspects of our lives and allow our fellow world dwellers to live their lives without demanding they conform to our way of thinking. What a difference it would make if we could live and let live.
