Hello all, Chair of the PC here again. We've had a few enquiries about the planters by the cross on Broad Street. There has been some road resurfacing going on which necessitated moving the boxes. Unfortunately the workforce removed the compost and in replacing it, left out the stones which were in the bottom of the planters! Consequently, a large lorry was able to adjust the position of one of them, and the poor old bulbs are trying to show a brave face from deep in the planter rather than being up and showy in the top. The planters must be moved back again as they are primarily there to protect the cross, but this is a job for a large vehicle and a bit of road stoppage, not going to be easy for the Parish Council. Many of us feel strongly that N-Som should come and reposition them and would appreciate the support of residents in making individual complaints about their failure to do so.

I hope everyone is managing to keep warm, cold and damp is worse than freezing but dry I think. Looking forward to the spring.

Good news about the Millennium Green!

The Environment Agency drop in event in the Old School Rooms on 23rd February brought good news for

the village. The horrendously damaging plans for the Green have been abandoned! No trees will be removed, the Green will stay its present size and construction will take just a month, not 18 as originally planned. The Environment Agency will do some minor work along the rhyne and lower the river embankment in the field beyond the Green to improve drainage. They also promise to reinstate/repair the path from the car park to the Green after the work has been completed. Many thanks to local residents who repeatedly said the proposed changes were unnecessary for flood protection and would destroy our much-loved Millennium Green.

Village Clean up. Keep Congresbury Litter Free.

We are not yet winning the battle, but we are mustering the troops. There will be a Village Clean up session on Saturday May 11th. Congresbury Youth Partnership was registered as a charity in 2003, with the aims of providing facilities for recreation and other leisure time activities for children and young people resident in Congresbury, developing their physical, mental, and spiritual wellbeing and supporting adults and young people volunteering in the community. Initially this was seen primarily as a way to meet an apparent need of other smaller groups for additional support, although CYP did run a very popular one-week summer playscheme for several years.

Over the years, the organisation changed and expanded. The young people's Millennium Cybercafe, bid for by and run by the Youth Council was handed on to CYP when members of the Youth Council grew up and moved away, and later CYP took on management of the Youth Club building, where a successful North Somerset funded club ran until the Youth Service nationally fell foul of "austerity", providing a weekly safe space, with advice on drug and alcohol misuse, sexual health information, and specific week-long projects targeting young people at risk of dropping out of education, or of offending. Camping trips, offshore sailing experiences, legalised graffiti, motor bike and go kart projects were arranged to channel potential offenders. It appears that dismembering the youth service may be a false economy, which could cost us more down the line.

As someone involved with CYP since its beginnings, I've seen lots of change. I ask myself why we no longer have a Youth Council, why youth services became no longer seen as important nationally, and why the funding is no longer available for the projects that used to happen, and that I have experienced changing lives for vulnerable young people.



However, our village community is very fortunate in having a Parish Council who were prepared to pick up some of the services no longer provided by the district authority, and CYP now receives part of its funding from the parish, which is supplemented by fundraising by adults and young people. We also have access to BLUEY, to take members out of the village to broaden their experience, which we do in school holidays. In term time we run three weekly sessions in the CYC building:

Monday 3.30 - 6pm - Code Club, supporting young people of all age experimenting with SCRATCH and PYTHON coding languages, and with simple electronics.

Wednesday 3.30 - 5pm - After school club for school years 4 to 6

Wednesday 6.30 - 8.30 - Youth Club for school years 7 - 11.

Easter Holiday Activities: Wednesday 3rd 10am - 4 pm at CYC Monday 8th Bus to Bristol Weds 10th Mulligan's Indoor Golf

See our Facebook page for our Spring Half Term Activities at the end of May.

The first attendance at any session is free, thereafter a charge between £1.50 and £2.20 is made to cover basic running costs. Trips have additional costs, of course, but CYP is always happy to negotiate support for those who have difficulty with meeting the costs. The main aim is still to support the wellbeing of young people. We really welcome young people coming through the door and asking us to help them organise the things they want to do.

We also need the support of adults in the community, to help run the regular clubs, provide one-off skills sessions, and of course to help with the funding. If you can't join us in person, you could join the 100 Club lottery which currently costs £12 for 12 monthly draws.
